SUBJECT: Your Meeting with members of the Global Climate

Coalition, June 21, 2001, 9:10 - 9:50 a.m.

On Thursday morning you will speak to members of the Global Climate Coalition (GCC), a group formed a number of years ago to coordinate the participation of business and industry in domestic and international climate change policy making. GCC members are completely supportive of the Administration's position on climate change and the rejection of the Kyoto Protocol.

Our objectives are:

- To emphasize the Administration's commitment to develop a realistic and effective response to climate change;
- To brief members on the status of the climate change policy review and principles important to policy development; and
- To solicit GCC ideas on alternative to Kyoto as part of continuing dialogue with friends and allies;

GCC participants, some of whom are scientific experts, will state that they are 100% behind the remarks articulated by the President on climate change policy. They will be greatly interested in further elaboration of the Administration's domestic and international climate change policy. In general, GCC favors voluntary actions, flexible market-based mechanisms and the development of cost-effective technologies. They will want to know our intentions for the resumed session of COP6.

Talking Points

Climate Change is a serious problem:

Administration seeks realistic and effective policies.

Protocol was not appropriate response:

- No signal whatsoever that developing countries would have eventually participated.
- Potentially too costly and would never have been ratified.
 Better to start over now rather than continue charade.

Future constructs:

- Hold to Principles response must be global, reasoned and flexible; include market incentives and incentives for technological innovation; sustain economic growth.
- Protect U.S. interests in the international negotiations.
- Guard against trade sanctions as means to force Protocol upon the United States.

Solicit views in developing an effective and market-based response:

- · POTUS rejected Kyoto, in part, based on input from you.
- POTUS believes, however, we need to show leadership on this issue to advance U.S. domestic and international policy objectives.
- Interested in hearing from you, what type of international alternatives to Kyoto would you support?

The Olabal Climate Coatilies believes that elemate change is a long-term, global issue, and therefore policies to address climate concerns must also be designed for the long-term by all nations. The GCC believes that it is imperative that climate policies force on responsible voluntary actions, including further research, innovation and deployment of current and polential toturn technologies in developed and developing nations to address concerns about the climate. Unrealistic largets and timelobles, such as those catlent for under the Kyare Protocol, are not achievable without coverely harming the U.S. aconomy and all American femilies, workers, seniors and children. A new approach to climate policy is necessar.

The 21st Century Climate Action Agenda is intended to serve as a living document to help golde the Global Climate Coallifon in the continuing partnerships with policy makers in the international community, in the Coagress, and in the turrent and future Administrations to responsibly and effectively respond to global concerns about the climate.

- A. The GCC will continue to lead by example, eggressively promoting long-term voluntary actions by all to:
 - 1. assess greenhouse gas emissions and sinks

 - research, develop and deploy cost-effective technologies that are environmentally sound and energy efficient
- The GCC will continue to encourage an open and factual public dialogue on the global climate issue, including:

- A. The GCC will continue working with policy makers in support of a balanced international approach to address concerns about the climate that does not barm the U.S. commity or hart American workers and families. The GCC will continue offering extensive to international policy makers in the development of responsible climate policy initiatives that encourage technology transfer, investment, economic growth and improved environmental and living sundayds for all nations.
- B. Support for Flexible Market-Based Mechanism Concepts

 Consistent with the previsions of the Byrd/Hagel resolution (5, Res. 98) in prevent economic harm to American families and workers, the GCC will continue its strong support for the inclusion of the flexible mechanism concepts (5missions Trading, Clean Development Mechanism, Joint Implementation, and Sinks) in international climate policy discussions. The GCC will also continue to stand behind U.S. government support for unrestricted application of these espential mechanisms.
- C. Participation by All Nations

 The GCC acknowledges the expressed will of the American people through S. Res. 98 (105th Congress). The GCC further agrees with the Senare that no related international obligation should be entered into absent specific scheduled, communicates for emissions reductions from "developing countries," and absent a detailed accounting of the economic costs to the citizens of the United States of America.
- D. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC)

GCC members will continue to participate in IPCC meetings, workshops, as Irad authors and expert reviewers of IPCC documents to remain constructively engaged in the important task of gaining a better understanding of the climate system and other issues related to petential climate change.
